VASARI'S FLORENCE

n 1988, the Beinecke Rare Book & Manuscript Library acquired a portion of the Vasari family archive, including documents concerning the life and career of the great biographer, artist, and architect, Giorgio Vasari. The Beinecke Library and National Endowment for the Humanities proudly sponsor this international symposium, VASARI'S FLORENCE, organized by Philip Jacks of Yale University, bringing together historians of Renaissance art and literature from around Europe and America. The talks will cover a variety of themes, including the structure and genre of the Vite de' più eccellenti pittori, scultori e architettori, the relationship between theory and practice in Vasari's oeuvre, his activities as collector and critic, and the collaboration between Vasari and the celebrated literato, Vincenzo Borghini, on the decoration of the Medici apartments in the Palazzo Vecchio.

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In addition to the symposium, the Yale University Art Gallery will host an exhibition of drawings, prints, books, and manuscripts documenting the work of Vasari, from his roots in Arezzo to familiar at the court of Cosimo I, Grand Duke of Florence and Tuscany, and the oeuvre of his Mannerist contemporaries: Cristofano Gherardi, Giovanni Battista Naldini, Francesco Salviati, Jan van der Straet, Federico Zuccaro, and Jacopo Zucchi. This exhibition has been made possible by a grant from the Mellon Foundation, the generosity of Florence B. Selden, and loans from the Beinecke Rare Book & Manuscript Library, the National Gallery of Canada, Wadwsorth Atheneum, Metropolitan Museum of Art, Art Institute of Chicago, The Detroit Institute of Art, The Pierpont Morgan Library, Harvard University Art Museums, and Museum of Art, Princeton University. The exhibition will be on view at the Gallery, corner of

In conjunction with the conference, the Beinecke Library has organized a week-long workshop conducted by Dr. Gino Corti, noted archivist of the Italian Renaissance, who will introduce graduate students to the study of original documents.

Conference talks are open to the public and will be held at the Yale University Art Gallery and the Whitney Humanities Center, corner of Wall & Temple Sts. On Friday evening, April 15, John Shearman will deliver the keynote address at the Yale Art Gallery followed by a reception at the Beinecke Library, corner of Wall & High Sts.
